The Foundation: **FULL OF LIFE**

Given the difficult economic times, prudence was the guiding principle in 2008-2009. Our primary consideration was to make optimal use of existing resources in an effort to maintain the current services offered to people touched by cancer, as their ranks continue to swell.

Despite the economic uncertainty, the Quebec Cancer Foundation raised more than \$5 million through the exceptional generosity of the public, associations and corporations in Quebec. This invaluable encouragement has enabled us to help the thousands of people living with cancer, who called on our lodging, information and support services this year in order to ease the stress of their difficult journey.

The goodwill of our donors reflects a relationship of trust based on the usefulness and importance of the services we provide. From Quebec City to the Outaouais, Estrie, Mauricie and Montreal, we are pursuing our development efforts and securing growing financial support in outlying regions, particularly among the business community. Thanks to the commitment and energy of our teams and hundreds of volunteers, the Foundation is strongly rooted in the communities it serves and alive and well in the hearts of Quebecers.

In 2008-2009, the Foundation received a final instalment of \$446,775 from the Ministère de la Santé et des

Services sociaux, as part of an overall contribution of \$2,070,045 over 5 years. This sum, combined with the gifts of many donors, allowed us to open Lodges in Trois-Rivières and Gatineau and expand our Sherbrooke facility, confirming our position as the leading provider of accommodation services for people touched by cancer in Quebec, with a total of 126 beds.

Also worthy of note is the Foundation's role in promoting and defending the interests of Quebecers with cancer, as a founding member of the Coalition Priorité Cancer au Québec and one its active stakeholders.

At the dawn of its 30th anniversary, the Foundation is looking to the future with confidence, emboldened by the support of its generous, loyal donors. While maintaining the quality of our services, in coming months, we intend to enhance their accessibility for those touched by cancer who live in proximity to our Regional Centres. To this end, we wish to increase that portion of our funding that comes from corporations, associations and private foundations and further promote planned giving.

We extend our deep gratitude to all those whose enthusiasm, energy and faith in our cause fuel life at the Foundation and broaden the influence of our unique mission, that of providing services directly to people living with cancer across Quebec.

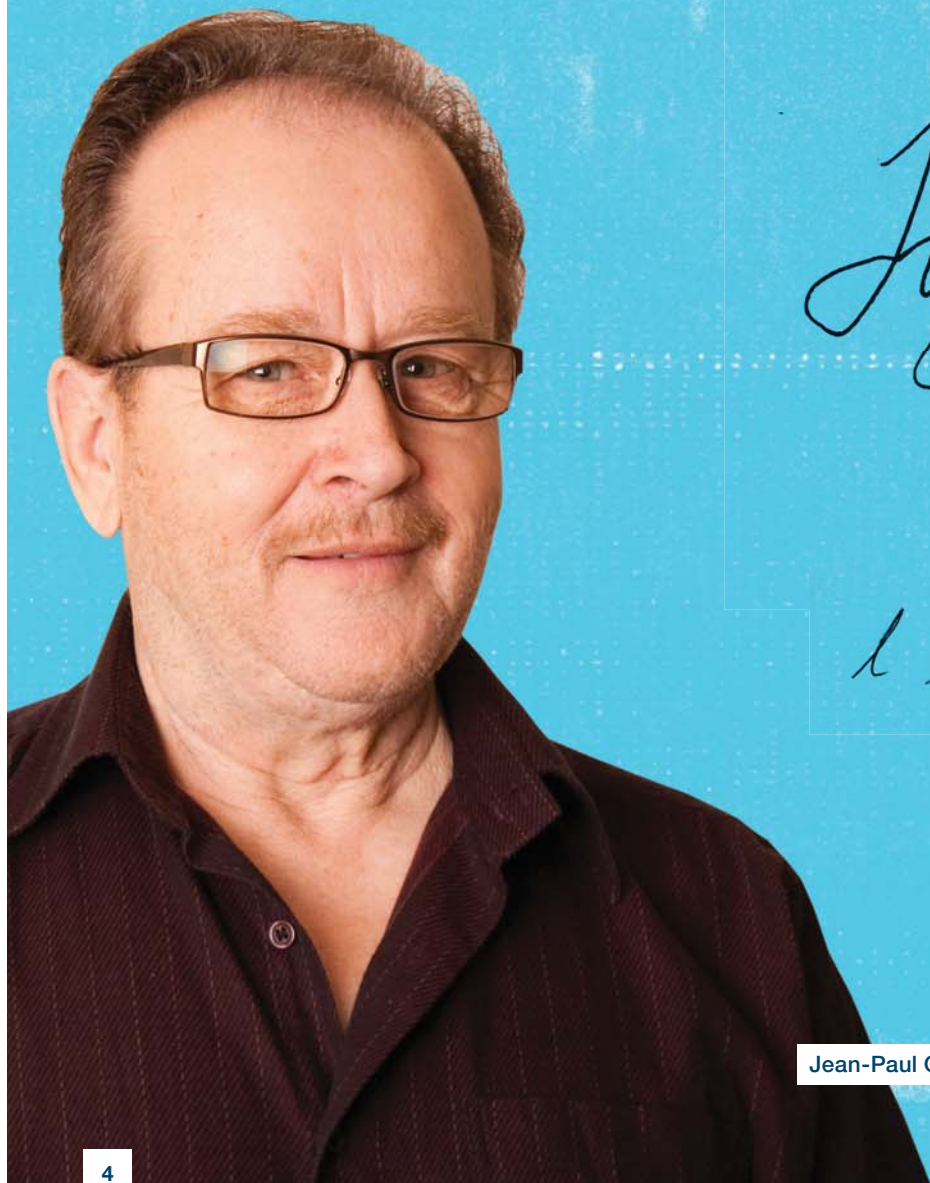

Our services LODGING

Because support matters.

In 2008-2009, at its Lodges in Montreal, Sherbrooke, Trois-Rivières and Gatineau, the Foundation welcomed 3,102 residents for a total of 20,331 nights and average stays ranging from 4 to 6 weeks.

Since 1988, the Foundation's Lodges have served as the largest accommodation network for people with cancer who need to move closer to larger centres for treatment. Living at a Foundation Lodge allows residents to share their trials and tribulations with others who are also struggling with the disease. At our Lodges, away from their loved ones and their homes, our residents discover a friendly, positive and reassuring living environment. There they receive more than just room and board at a reasonable cost; they also obtain support and comfort from caring employees and volunteers on a daily basis.

INFORMATION

Because knowledge is comfort.

In 2008-2009, the Foundation answered 2,684 calls to its Info-Cancer Line and lent or distributed 22,061 documents through its Documentation Centre.

Faced with the uncertainty and fear of a cancer diagnosis, those affected, their families and their friends need to be informed about the disease. From its Regional Centre in Quebec City, the Foundation is a major supplier of information on cancer. At the end of the line, our specialized nurses and documentalists provide answers, support and a listening ear to people touched by cancer, their loved ones, the general public and health professionals.

Documentation Centre



The Documentation Centre, North America's leading French-language library specialized in oncology, features a collection of 5,000 works on the various facets of cancer and ways of coping with the disease: types of cancers and their symptoms, treatment options and their side effects, available support, complementary therapies, nutrition and much more.

In 2008-2009, the Foundation acquired 300 new titles and reviewed its Web catalogue in order to make information searches more user-friendly. It also developed "travelling collections" for the residents of its Lodges.

Causes, symptoms, warning signs, treatment options and their side effects, resources available in each region... the Foundation answers all these questions and more, with expertise and empathy.

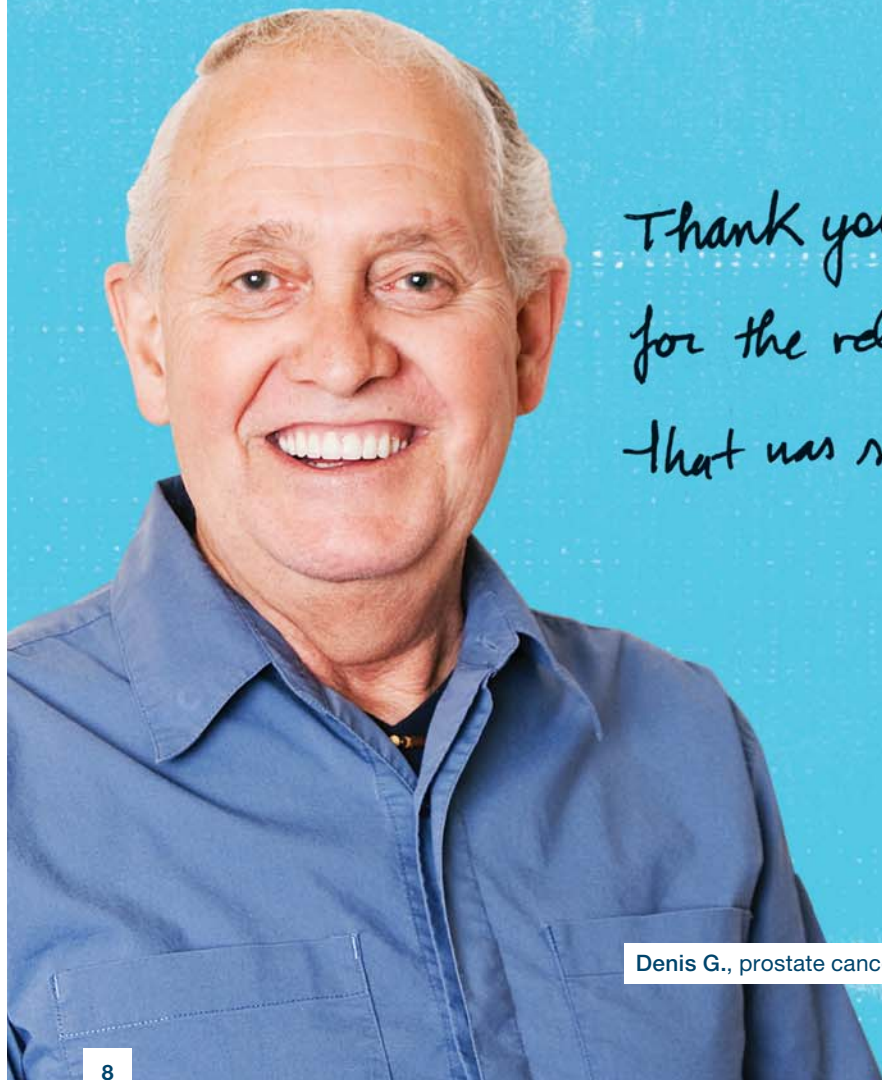

Foundation guides

The Foundation guides provide answers and advice to those living with cancer, their families and their friends. This year, the brochures *Bien manger pour mieux vivre* and *Ce qu'il faut savoir sur la radiothérapie* were reviewed and updated by health professionals. In 2008-2009, more than 17,000 guides were dispensed across the health network and distributed to the general public.



Our services SUPPORT

Because sharing eases the burden.

In 2008-2009, people living with cancer were given 13,155 opportunities to take advantage of the positive effects of the Foundation's activities and complementary therapies.

A true pioneer in the area of complementary approaches, the Foundation was the first organization to offer activities, such as art therapy and kinesiology, outside palliative care units. These activities have been recognized as effective tools in the fight against cancer, since they help people regain strength, energy and peace of mind, while contributing to reducing the pain of the disease. The Foundation offers these at no or minimal cost in its five Regional Centres.

Telephone matching service: A great support network

Telephone matching allows a person living with cancer (or a loved one) to share their burden with someone who has gone through a similar cancer experience. During their conversations, those receiving help draw strength and courage, while those providing support are able to give meaning to their past struggle. In 2008-2009, approximately one hundred people were matched together to share their experience and discuss the impact of the disease on their lives.

Through its Regional Centres, the Quebec Cancer Foundation has far-reaching influence in Quebec's main cities and beyond. The vitality of its five Centres is evidenced as much by the services it offers as by the fundraising activities organized in the community in support of the Foundation.

Highlights in 2008-2009:

Montreal

A more welcoming living environment

Thanks to the cooperation of Maison Corbeil, the 24 rooms and 5 lounges at the Montreal Regional Centre and Lodge have been refurbished to provide a warmer, more comfortable décor for its residents. Design-architect Dominique Bourgeois graciously offered advice on the selection and layout of the new furniture.

Estrie

Unique expertise

Since January 2009, the Foundation and the neuro-oncology program at the CHUS have been hosting *Coeur-en-tête*, a support group for people affected by a brain tumour and their loved ones. Inspired by the struggles of renowned ballet dancer Nathalie Buisson who, in 2004, failed to find the French-language psychological support she was looking for, this service draws on the unique, recognized expertise of Dr. David Fortin, a leading figure in neuro-oncology.

Mauricie

More services for people of the region

In 2009, the Mauricie team expended considerable effort bolstering its support services. Workshops on Qi Gong – a gentle form of therapeutic gymnastics – creative expression, kinesiology, along with massage therapy, were made available in Trois-Rivières and surrounding areas to those battling cancer. The team also worked on

creating a support group for men with prostate cancer, which is expected to greet participants in 2009-2010.

Outaouais

Support and reassurance in Gatineau

Since December 2008, the coffee get-together hosted by Angèle Hudon at the Outaouais Regional Centre and Lodge has been open to people living with cancer, their families and friends in the region, giving them access to the information and assistance they need. In a friendly, relaxed atmosphere, Ms. Hudon has been welcoming residents for the past four years along with Françoise Saumure. Both cancer survivors, they share their personal stories in a calm, uplifting way.

Quebec City

An original program for the business community

Over the past year, the Quebec City team has developed an information program for the business community. Conferences, documentation and professional advice are helping business people be better prepared should cancer strike a member of their staff. President of Marie-Lou Évolution, Sylvie Chalifour, who was confronted with her own cancer diagnosis and that of a friend and colleague who later passed away, is the program's spokesperson.

Community initiatives

In 2008-2009, across Quebec, hundreds of people took action in support of the Foundation's cause. Together, they raised over \$150,000. Their giving spirit helped to provide concrete assistance to thousands of Quebecers fighting cancer. Thank you!

DEVELOPMENT

Quebecers are the heart and soul of our organization. The positive impact of their commitment and generosity can be felt across Quebec, fuelling life at the Foundation and promoting the well-being of those battling cancer.

Direct mailing

Since 1993, those supporting the activities of the Foundation through its direct mailing campaign have once again demonstrated tremendous loyalty and generosity. In fact, in 2008-2009, some 50,000 donors contributed a sum of \$1,675,915. The Foundation also attracted 7,458 new donors this year.

In memoriam and planned gifts

We are always moved and appreciative when receiving gifts in memory of a loved one. This year, 7,140 opted to show their generosity in this way, raising \$409,461. In addition, the Foundation received 15 bequests totalling \$353,939.

Nutri-sac campaign



The 3rd annual Nutri-sac campaign held in various public locations in Montreal, Quebec City, Estrie, Outaouais and Mauricie ended on a highly successful note. Thanks to the dedication of hundreds of volunteers working across Quebec and the exemplary commitment of **Étienne**

Boulay, Montreal Alouettes' No. 22 and provincial spokesperson for the campaign, the sale of dried nuts and fruit pouches generated \$145,853 in donations.



In Estrie, the Foundation attracted the support of spokesperson **André Bolduc**, coach of the Vert & Or Université de Sherbrooke football team, and the Radio NRJ Sherbrooke crew, who promoted the event.

Corporate campaign

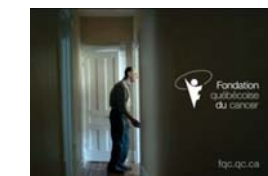
Website

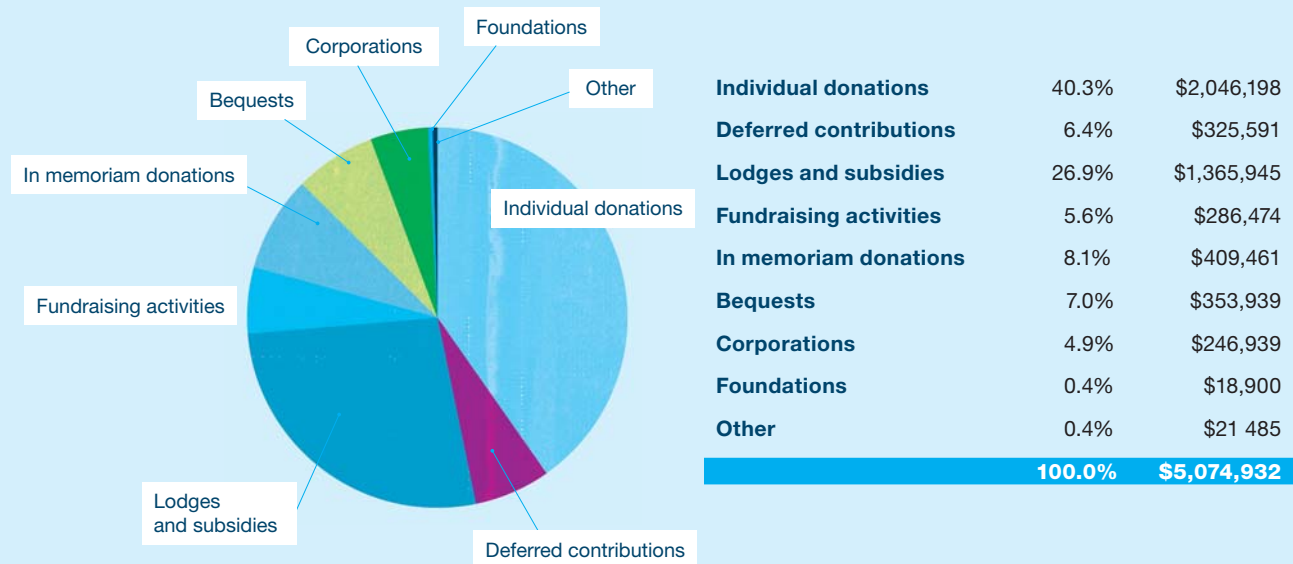

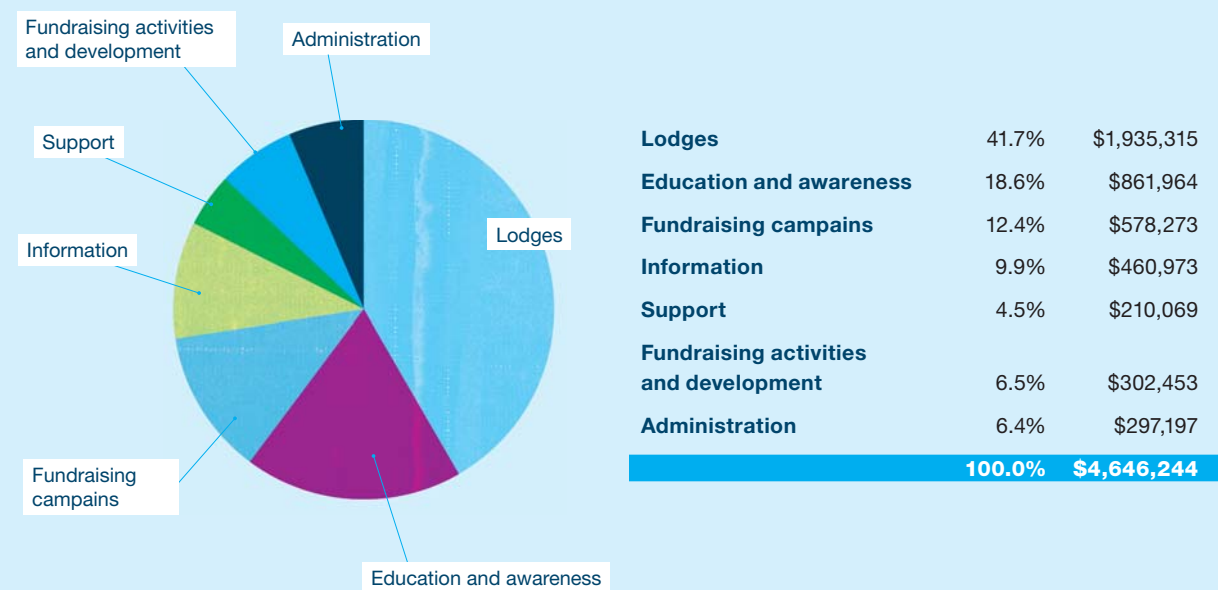
